## MAY 2, 2015 TRIBAL COUNCIL MEETING

The Regular Saturday Tribal Council Meeting was held on May 2, 2015, at the Ojibwa Casino Resort Conference Room in Baraga, Michigan. President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr., presided over the meeting with Jennifer Misegan, Toni Minton, Susan J. LaFernier, Doreen Blaker, Robert R.D. Curtis, Jr., Eddy Edwards, Randall Haataja, Michael F. LaFernier, Sr., and Gary F. Loonsfoot, Sr. present. Not present: Don Messer, Jr., and Donald Shalifoe, Sr.

President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr. shared numerous *Thank You* and *For Your Information* items addressed to Council.

President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr. gave the President's Report (page three), Toni Minton gave the Secretary's Report (page three), and Larry Denomie III gave the CEO's Report (page five). Council approved the Department Head Reports for the month of March 2015, and approved the meeting minutes for April 2, 2015, April 11, 2015, and April 16, 2015.

Lori Sherman, Director of Keweenaw Bay Tribal Natural Resources Department (KBNRD), presented an amendment to the services agreement and consultant agreement with Luis Verissimo in relation to LiDar Data. This agreement was previously approved when Ken Marshall was employed and was doing the LiDar Data. Luis Verissimo, as an independent contractor, is providing the services for KBIC now. Motion by Robert R.D. Curtis, Jr. to approve the amendment to the service agreement between the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community and Luis Verissimo, Consultant, supported by Doreen Blaker. Nine supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, two absent (Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Lori Sherman, KBNRD Director, presented Council with the Baraga County Road Commissioner's Gomache Creek Project Agreement for Fish Passages. The funding for this project is provided by NRFC, Superior Watershed, and USDA, to fix the culvert area, so fish can get from point A to point B. Six of the twelve projects have been completed. Four have been completed by the Baraga County Road Commission; two were completed by Tribal Public Works. The Gomache Creek Project was originally planned to be completed by Tribal Public Works, but they had to back out of the project as they were too busy to do it. As these projects began in 2012, Ojibwa Roads Department was not in operation; now time is of the essence, and these projects need to be completed. The Ojibwa Roads Department will be involved in future project bids. Baraga County Road Commissioners will be informed that the TERO guidelines within this contract are to be adhered to. Motion by Robert R.D. Curtis, Jr. to approve the Project Agreement between the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community and the Baraga County Road Commission for the Gomache Creek Project, supported by Susan J. LaFernier. Eight supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Curtis, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), one opposed (Edwards), 0 abstained, two absent (Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Lori Sherman, KBNRD Director, presented Council with the Baraga County Road Commissioner's Menge Creek Project Agreement for Fish Passages. Baraga County Road Commissioners will be informed that the TERO guidelines within this contract are to be adhered to. Motion by Susan J. LaFernier to approve the Project Agreement between the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community and the Baraga **County Road Commission for the Menge** Creek Project, supported by Michael F. LaFernier, Sr. Eight supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Curtis, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), one opposed (Edwards), 0 abstained, two absent (Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Lori Sherman, KBNRD Director, presented Council with bids for fencing. This will be a fence at the garden as they are putting in an orchard. Ms. Sherman recommended the bid of the Ojibwa Builders with a timeframe for completion. Motion by Jennifer Misegan to approve the bid for the fence from the Ojibwa Builders in the amount of \$10,200, supported by Robert R.D. Curtis, Jr. Eight supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Curtis, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, three absent (Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Treasurer Doreen Blaker presented the May 2015 donations requests. Consensus of the Council was to refer the request of the 16<sup>th</sup> Annual Ishpeming Renaissance Festival and Art Faire August 1<sup>st</sup> event to the Ojibwa Casino for donation. Motion by Eddy Edwards to approve \$500.00 for Cheryl Besette's donation request for medical travel to Ann Arbor, MI, \$500.00 for David LaFreniere's request for a Sundance Spiritual Ceremony in July, \$500.00 for the Nokomis Learning Center's request for a donation for center operations, \$1,000.00 for the Native American Rights Fund donation request, \$500.00 for Baraga County Relay for Life

- Team Shanahan, and \$500.00 for Baraga County Relay for Life - Yooper Kings & Queens of Baraga Team for a total of \$3,500.00, supported by Robert R.D. Curtis, Jr. Nine supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, two absent (Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Doreen Blaker, Treasurer, presented Proposed Ordinance 2015-02 Election Ordinance. Motion by Doreen Blaker to waive the reading and to Introduce the Proposed Ordinance 2015-02 and to schedule a second reading during the June 6, 2015 meeting at 10:00 a.m., supported by Toni Minton. Nine supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, two absent (Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Council held the Second Reading to hear public comments for the Proposed Ordinance 2015-01 to allow and recognize same sex marriages and update Title Seven, Section 1, Marriages, and Section 2, Termination of Marriages. Council scheduled a Third Reading for the June 6, 2015 meeting.

Council moved into closed session with President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr., on the agenda. After returning to open session, Council adjourned with no further motions.

#### April 2, 2015 Special Meeting

- Approved the December 2014 and January 2015 Department Head Reports.
- Approved the meeting minutes of February 27, 2015, and March 2, 2015.
- Approved changes to the contracts and agreements section of the Purchasing and Procurement Policy and also the contract and service agreement procedures for Tier I, II, III, and IV.
- The check signers for the IDA accounts for the Housing Department will be the individual account holder and the Executive Board.

#### April 2, 2015 Telephone Poll

• Approved the contract of CEO, Larry Denomie, III.

#### April 11, 2015 Regular Meeting

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE MONTHS OF MARCH AND APRIL 2015

The following is a list of activities that occurred in the office of the President for the months of March and April 2015:

- I appointed Randy Haataja to the Board of Jury Selectors for the Community's Tribal Court.
- I informed Ojibwa Housing Authority's Board members in writing of the Council's decision to eliminate the Board of Commissioners and the duties thereof.
- We continue to engage in a government -to-government consultation between U.S. Environmental Protection Agency regarding the Humboldt Mill Historic Ore Processing Facility in Marquette, MI.

of Treaty Rights under our jurisdiction. We also did an inventory of the Walleye resources in our area and determined that the Community has a need for those resources. Based on that inventory and our Home Territory Laws, we were able to convince other tribes that the Community had a need for the resource. Other tribes took that into consideration and decided not to engage in spring-spearing activities of the inland meeting has been set up with the Bureau to discuss his plans regarding the future of our forests.

- I signed Court and Registration Station subcontracts with GLIFWC for 2014. In addition to signing, I requested an increase from GLIFWC to help offset labor expenses related to spring-harvesting of Walleye. The additional funds were approved by GLIFWC.
- I received a letter from Joseph O'Leary

- Early in March, I attended a meeting with Michigan Department of Quality related to pre-application technical review aspects of potential non-ferrous metallic mineral mining projects. This meeting was attended by Keweenaw Bay Tribal Natural Resources Department staff, as well as other members of the Lake Superior Bands of Chippewa Indians. The dialogue went well; we exchanged valuable information and set the course for continued consultation around mining projects that affect our way of life.
- Also early in February and March, Councilman Loonsfoot and I attended a number of meetings to educate and inform other Indians about our Home Territory Laws as they relate to the exercise

resources within our Home Territory.

- I'm happy to report that the Community is now a part of a community based Torch Lake Watershed Advisory Council (TLWAC). Their purpose is to communicate Area of Concern (AOC) priorities to the DEQ and EPA and inform the development of a Torch Lake Watershed Management Plan. A focus of the project will be to collect what is already known and share historic and recent project information with the TLWAC so that a common base of knowledge is shared and can be built upon by the group.
- I was informed by our Tribal Forester of a need to meet with the BIA regarding the objectives for our Tribal lands before we move forward with logging. He also informed me that we need to consider cultural use and non-timber forest products when we determine objectives on our grandchildren's land. The initial

requesting 2% funds on behalf of Baraga County, the Baraga School District, Baraga Township, Baraga Village, the L'Anse School District, L'Anse Township, and L'Anse Village. They're asking that the local units of government in Baraga County receive an amount equivalent to what they used to receive pursuant to a 1994 agreement between KBIC and Baraga County, Baraga Township, and L'Anse Township.

The Keweenaw Bay Tribal Court participated in an assessment prepared by the Jacobson Law Group for the BIA, Office of Justice Services, and Division of Tribal Justice Support. The purpose of the assessment sought to provide an overview of the Tribe's justice system, recognize areas that function well, and identify areas for improvement. We've learned that the KBIC Tribal Court is a high-functioning Court. The Court is



able to administer justice in a timely and expeditious manner, with cases being resolved well within national averages. Community perception of the Court is positive, and Stakeholders are satisfied with the manner in which cases are handled. Although there are minor areas for improvement, overall the Court operates without major areas of concern to the Assessment Team. A meeting has been set to discuss the findings with Tribal Court Staff and Council.

- I accepted the letter of resignation from the Executive Director of the Ojibwa Housing Authority (OHA). Vicki Dompier was appointed Interim Executive Director of OHA.
- I accepted a letter of resignation from the Tribal Attorney Dan McNeil. We are in the process of finding a replacement for him.
- The KBNRD Director has forwarded the Final Draft of the 2014 Fish Management plan to Council for its review prior to approval. The plan is being reviewed for suggested changes.
- We were informed that the MDEQ has • approved the Eagle Mine Groundwater Discharge Permit that takes effect on April 1<sup>st</sup>. Last year we submitted comments and recommended a number of changes for influent wastewater characterization; monitoring of the influent; water quality standards and Wastewater Treatment Facility; and recommendations for site hydrogeology and monitoring. We also requested that a Clean Water Act NPDES permit be used as an additional regulatory tool at the Eagle Mine WWTF in order to protect tribal trust resources and navigable waters of the United States.
- Early in April, the Office of the President authorized the Assistant Tribal Attorney to work on contracts related to Baraga County Road Commission work to replace some culverts. Approval was granted as requested.
- We received funding from CITGO in the amount of about \$18,000.00. This funding will be used to help offset some expenses related to winter time heating, for those who are eligible.
- I signed a letter of support for the "Native American Studies Major" at Northern Michigan University. The Educational Policy Committee is seriously looking at creating this major at NMU.

They would be the first University in the State of Michigan to offer this type of program. I was more than happy to support their efforts to get this major.

- I participated in a conference call with Abigail Matthews, Grants Management Specialist, from the Eastern/Woodlands Office of Native American Programs. The purpose of the call was to discuss the process for the housing authority to be run as a department of the Tribe.
- The TERO office and I are working on clearing up an issue related to hiring seasonal workers under the WIA program run by the Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan. We are scheduled to appear before the Inter-Tribal Council (ITC) board soon to make our case that our local policy allows the hiring of seasonal workers.
- We are working on forming a Waste
  Management Committee. One of the goals of the committee is to work on an ordinance related to waste management. We are currently in the notification process to form the committee.
- Recently the Council approved a Bridge loan and an agreement related to the same for Aanikoosing Inc.
- I attended a meeting with Dr. Susan Hedman from Region V out of Chicago, Illinois, regarding FY 2016 tribal capacity grants under the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI). This proposal would cut KBIC funding by as much as 77.5% from \$200,000.00 per year to \$45,000.00. These drastic cuts are unwarranted and unjustified. It is absurd to suggest that a pool of \$250 million dollars is insufficient to continue to provide a 0.5% share for tribal capacity programs. We need the funding to continue to do the good things we have been doing to protect our reservation resources. government-to-А government consultation with EPA is in the works to discuss this decrease in funding levels.
- Based on information received from the Community's Natural Resources Department, I decided to open Portage Lake as a quota lake starting at dusk on April 17, 2015. Since the opening of the lake we have harvested about 650 fish. This is well below our quota, and the fishing appears to be slow based on recent reports. As of today (May 2, 2015) we are still managing it as a quota lake.
- I received the annual audit report from

- The Office of the President is also continuing ongoing work on the Sales and Use Tax Project, Two Part Concurrence/ Fee-to-Trust Application, Employment Law/Grievance Procedures, Marijuana Use on Reservation, Canal Lands, and Treatment of Community as a State under the Clean Water Act.
- The Ojibwa Language Program is set to start in the L'Anse and Baraga Schools for the fall of 2015. Early indications are that there appears to be a strong interest in learning the language. This is good news in our efforts to preserve our language.
- Unfortunately, we received news that our petition for an additional signal for our radio stations was not approved by the FCC. It appears the FCC is taking a very narrow approach to the newlyadopted Tribal priority procedures and is going to be highly unwilling to grant any waivers. Essentially they said that we already operate two stations and may have interfered with a Canadian Allotment.

This concludes my report.

## **CEO'S REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL 2015**

During the month of April 2015, the CEO's office reports the following:

- I have been assisting our Health Director in the finalizing of our two physicians' contracts. Both are expected to be ready for Council's review and consideration next week.
- The FY15 3% annual raise approved April 17 for employees in Grades 5 and higher is being processed by both the enterprise and government payroll departments. Eligible employees should see the raise on their May 8 paychecks. The 10% wage increase approved March 2 for employees below Grade 5 has been processed for some employees this past paycheck and the remainder should see it on their May 8 paychecks. The 10% increase does place the Tribe competitively in the jobs market following the State of MI minimum wage increase in September of 2014 to \$8.15 per hour for non-tipped employees. The state minimum wage is set to increase in January of 2016, 2017, and 2018, to \$8.50, \$8.90, and \$9.25 per hour respectively. The Tribe's 10% increase will remain competitive through the state's 2017 increase.
- Our office continues to meet with staff of the Housing Department and Holding Company businesses. Francis La-Pointe, CFO, is engaging the services of Lake Accounting to assist current staff until an accountant is hired permanently. We are also in the process of analyzing the organizational structure of both entities and identifying opportunities to mesh operations throughout the Tribe as a means to build capacity, keep employees working during slow periods, and minimize costs.
- The Ojibwa Casinos held employee recognition luncheons mid-April. Five Marquette and three Baraga employees received jackets for 10 years of service; five Marquette and four Baraga employees received \$100 for 15 years; three Marquette and eight Baraga employees received \$200 for 20 years; three Baraga employees received \$500 for 25 . years; and one Baraga employee, Lori Picard, who is a Shift Manager, received \$750 for 30 years. She has worked at the Baraga property since it opened in November of 1985. (See related article for complete listing of employees by property.)
- Staff participated in a conference call . with HUD officials on the April 20, 2015. The call was scheduled to discuss the process required to complete the transition of making the Tribe's former Tribally Designated Housing Entity, a depart-

has been submitted to proceed with the process, and staff are working on the remaining steps. HUD officials indicated that the process should be completed within 30-45 days. We will continue to provide updates as the process moves forward.

- Members of the Tribe's Retirement Committee met on April 27 with representatives of M3 Financial, Mass Mutual, and Wells Fargo to review the 401 (k) and Defined Benefit retirement plans. The 401(k)'s plan assets have grown 2% from year ending 2013 to 2014 with nearly the same amount of participants. Average account balances have grown 3% year over year and the number of participants with loans grew 3%. Approximately 32% of participants in the plan have loans which is slightly higher than industry averages. Even though the number of participants has grown, the total of outstanding loan balances has decreased by 7%. Review of the investment options available to participants was conducted, and several of the underperforming funds have recommended replacement which will be brought to Council for approval. Based on actuarial calculations IRS minimum funding requirements, the Defined Benefit plan doesn't require contributions in the 2015 plan year. However, if contributions aren't made, the plan could require significant contributions in 2016. Since the FY15 approved budgets provides for payments into the plan, the payments will be made. Current asset allocations include 2.95% in cash investments, 1.71% in US Govt. Securities, and 95.34% in mutual funds which represents a three asset class approach. Upon review of the three classes and related performance, a recommendation by our advisors to convert to a four asset class approach was discussed and has the potential of increasing the overall performance of the plan. A formal request explaining the potential benefits and risks will be presented at an upcoming meeting for consideration.
- As the process of filling the General Manager position for the Tribe's casinos continues, the postings for the Casino Manager positions for each casino will take place. The posting will continue until the GM position is filled and will have the opportunity to select the Casino Manager positions.
- I have included for Council's review, the random drug screen results for the testing that occurred in February for governmental and enterprise employees.

## To <u>Native American Farmers or Ranchers</u> or the heir of one who was denied a <u>USDA farm loan</u> or loan servicing between 1981 and late 1999

Some funds paid in settlement of *Keepseagle v. Vilsack* remain unclaimed and will be distributed in accordance with a process established by the Court. The case claimed that USDA discriminated against Native Americans who applied for or tried to apply for farm loans or loan servicing. The Court seeks input from class members about how the remaining funds should be distributed. Of the \$680 million paid to settle the case, approximately \$380 million remains. The Settlement Agreement approved by the Court directs that unclaimed funds be given to non-profit organizations to serve Native American farmers and ranchers.

The deadline to file a claim has passed. There is no new claims process.

## Who is included?

The Class *includes* all Native American farmers and ranchers who:

- Farmed or ranched or attempted to do so between January 1, 1981 and November 24, 1999;
- Tried to get a farm loan or loan servicing from the USDA during that period; and
- Complained about discrimination to the USDA either on their own or through a representative during the time period.

The class *does not include* individuals who:

- Experienced discrimination only between January 1 and November 23 1997; or
- Complained of discrimination only between July 1 and November 23, 1997.

groups to serve Native farmers & ranchers over a 20 year period.

• \$38 million be distributed quickly to nonprofit organizations serving Native farmers & ranchers, identified by Class Counsel and approved by the Court.

The Trust would make grants to organizations providing business assistance, agricultural education, technical support, or advocacy services to Native American farmers and ranchers, including those seeking to become farmers or ranchers, to support and promote their continued engagement in agriculture. The USDA has agreed with this proposal.

*Second*, Marilyn Keepseagle proposes to distribute all remaining funds as additional damages paid to successful Track A claimants alone. The USDA opposes this proposal.

*Third*, other class members have asked to use the funds to pay claims that were initially denied or to permit new claims to be filed.

*Fourth*, the Choctaw Nation has argued that no changes should be made.

## How can I share my views?

If you want to tell the Court of your support of or opposition to any proposal for use of the remaining funds, you may submit written comments, postmarked no later than **June 15**, **2015**, to:

## Proposed use of the Funds

There are several competing options for how to distribute the funds.

*First,* Plaintiffs propose to modify the Settlement Agreement, subject to Court approval, to distribute the funds as follows:


