13th Annual KBIC Kids Fishing Derby Held

The 13th Annual KBIC Kids Fishing Derby was held on Saturday, June 27, 2015, at the Sand Point Pond near the Lighthouse in Baraga, Michigan. Derby Coordinator and KBNRD Fisheries and Wildlife Biologist, Gene Mensch, with the help of Keweenaw Bay Natural Resources Department (KBNRD) staff and many community volunteers, worked to make this event a success. Mensch said, "We had 388 Fisher-Kids registered this year. This is very comparable to last year's count, and we may have plateaued, but that's a lot of kids. KBNRD manages the fish from ice-out for the derby. There are mostly panfish stocked in the Derby Pond: Blue Gill, Rock Bass, and Pumpkinseed; and Yellow Perch, Black Crappie, and Bullheads. We also strategically plant some

> predators: Large and Small Mouth **Bass** and Northern Pike."

Mensch "The said, **KBIC** Council finances the majority of the event, and groups like the Superior Watershed Partnership and our own Summer Youth Program hire youth to work on various projects, including the derby. Many of our youth helpers were a part

of that,

JULY 18, 2015 TRIBAL COUNCIL MEETING

The Regular Saturday Tribal Council Meeting was held on July 18, 2015, at the Ojibwa Casino Resort Conference Room in Baraga, Michigan. President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr., presided over the meeting with Jennifer Misegan, Toni Minton, Susan J. LaFernier, Doreen Blaker (arrived late), Randall Haataja, Michael F. LaFernier, Sr., and Gary F. Loonsfoot, Sr. present. Not present: Robert R.D. Curtis, Jr., Eddy Edwards, Don Messer, Jr., and Donald Shalifoe, Sr.

President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr. shared numerous *Thank You* and *For Your Information* items addressed to Council.

Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr. gave the President's Report (page four), Toni Minton gave the Secretary's Report (page four) and Larry Denomie III gave the CEO's Report (page eight). Council passed Department Head Reports for May 2015.

Cecelia Chosa Dowd addressed Council through a letter for an increase in travel stipend for those attending Midewiwin Ceremonies and to make the stipends available four times a year when ceremonies are held. Motion by Gary Loonsfoot, Sr. to table this matter until budget meetings, due to lack of funding in the Cultural Resources Department, supported by Michael F. LaFernier, Sr. Six supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, five absent (Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Jordan Hoover, Head Coach Baraga Vikings Football, addressed Council with a request for financial assistance in replacing outdated helmets and shoulder pads for the Baraga Vikings Football Program. Coach Hoover explained how regulations mandate that helmets need to be certified every two years and are no longer able to be certified once ten years have expired. He said "We have helmets from 2005. In reviewing our injury records, Baraga High School Football players had a concussion rate that was 33 times the national average. The national average is one concussion in 893 games and practices combined. Baraga's average was one concussion in 27. The shoulder pads are about the same age as the helmets; they are in poor condition and need to be replaced as well." The program has been fundraising very aggressively, since we were consistently in the red and are now in the black around

\$700; however, there are no funds for the helmets and shoulder pads. Coach Hoover said, "The program needs a hand-up, not a hand-out. Once we're back on top with the equipment we can self sustain entirely through fundraising efforts." Motion by Jennifer Misegan to approve \$9,265.50 for the Baraga Vikings Football Program to be paid from the upcoming 2% funding allocations, supported by Randall Haataja. Six supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, five absent (Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried. Coach Hoover indicated that a 4' x 8' banner will be placed at the Viking field stating, "Thank you Keweenaw Bay Indian Community for the generous donation of our safety equipment."

Vice President Jennifer Misegan, presented the July 2015 donation requests on behalf of Treasurer Doreen Blaker. Motion by Susan J. LaFernier to approve \$2,500.00 for Marquette Shriner's transportation donation request, \$380.00 for **Baraga County Community Foundation** donation for the Tony Selkey Memorial Golf Scramble (Team and Tee) and to have our team donate any winnings back, \$800.00 for Grayson Roe donation for class trip to Italy/Greece in June 2016, and \$200.00 for George P. DeCota, Jr. donation to attend the 2015 Veteran's Golfers Assoc. National Championship for a total of \$3,880.00, supported by Gary Loonsfoot. Five supported (Minton, S. LaFernier, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), one opposed (Misegan), 0 abstained, five absent (Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion car-

Danielle Webb. Assistant Tribal Attornev. presented the Model 108 - CTGP Master Contract (181 pages) in the amount of \$1.4 million which funds Tribal Social Services, Natural Resources, General Assistance, Higher Education, Reality, and Tribal Court. It is a BIA standard contract with minor changes made, some missed citations and spelling errors, other than that it is in order and prioritized for funds through the Bureau. Motion by Gary Loonsfoot, Sr. to approve Model 108 – CTGP Master Contract for \$1.4 million, supported by Michael F. LaFernier, Sr. Six supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, five absent (Blaker, Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Danielle Webb, Assistant Tribal Attorney, presented the Model 108 - Law Enforcement Program Contract in the amount of \$439,000. It is a BIA standard contract with minor changes made, some missed citations and spelling errors. Motion by Jennifer Misegan to approve Model 108 - Law **Enforcement Program Contract with the** Bureau of Indian Affairs in the amount of supported by Susan J. \$439,000, LaFernier. Six supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Haataja, LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, one abstained (Blaker), four absent (Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion car-

Carole LaPointe, Health Director, and Danielle Webb, Assistant Tribal Attorney, presented a Henry Schein Dental Contract for a dental x-ray machine. A digital probe is put into the patient's mouth and the unit takes a picture of the mouth. It can do dental x-rays in five minutes rather than a half-an-hour with no more cardboard. It will work with the current x-ray units as the sensor replaces the film itself and will be filed into the chart electronically. Motion by Gary Loonsfoot, Sr. to approve the contract for the dental x-ray machine, supported by Toni Minton. Seven supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker,

Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, four absent (Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried

President Warren "Chris" Swartz, Jr. presented on behalf of KBOCC President Debra Parrish, her recommendation to appoint Cherie Dakota to the Board of Regents. As Ms. Parrish was not available, questions could not be clarified if the position had been advertised, etc. Motion by Gary Loonsfoot, Sr. to table this issue, supported by Doreen Blaker. Seven supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, four absent (Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

Susan J. LaFernier stated, "The Government Picnic Committee has been planning a picnic for government employees, KBIC committee members, and guests for July 31st at the L'Anse Golf Course. This is in appreciation of our employees. Last year we didn't have a Christmas Party, and we usually have a huge picnic where I believe 188 employees attend, so it is quite an event. We currently have 277 employees and committee members which will be including Ojibwa Housing this year. We want to have 180 prizes available and hopefully that will cover everyone who attends, so everyone will get a prize from the random drawing and that consists of cash which will be recorded from their payroll. There also are Pine's cards and some donated prizes from our vendors. All of the cash prizes may not be used depending on the number of people who attend. The expenses are the L'Anse Golf Course fee, golf carts, food, prizes for the games that will be happening, and the cash prizes for the grand drawing. Total cost is \$15,000 and after looking at the 560 budget line we had to do some adjusting as Council paid for the entire enterprise and government turkey and ham gift cards last year from Larry's and Pat's. We did just get a refund from that in June, and we do have a balance of about \$5,000. We are asking for an additional \$10,000. I also want to say 'Thank You' to Kim Klopstein and Gary Loonsfoot, Jr. for planning this picnic and prior picnics. It is an amazing amount of work to do all the games and the food for 200 plus people. They are accountable and desire much appreciation as our employees do." Motion by Michael F. Loonsfoot, Sr. to approve the 2015 Employee Picnic on July 31, 2015 and the request of \$10,000, supported by Toni Seven supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, four absent (Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

CEO Larry Denomie III presented the Maawaanji'iding Powwow Program's Guidelines in regards to the Tribal General Welfare Exclusion Act. Within that Act there are ways to allow payments to individuals to be excluded from taxation for certain types of activities. The Guidelines have been written in a way for these individuals who receive honorariums to be exempted of being issued a 1099 for that participation. Motion by Jennifer Misegan to approve the Program Guidelines for the Powwow, cosupported by Toni Minton and Doreen Seven supported (Misegan, Blaker. Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, four absent (Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

CEO Larry Denomie III previously had approval of a bid for The Rez Stop and Smoke Shop parking lot to be blacktopped. After some minor confusion about the area to be covered, square yards verses square feet, more detailed discussions occurred with the three bidders. The K Company, who was previously approved, has decided

to rescind their bid, due to lack of a truck driver. Denomie submitted a bid from Smith Construction of Marquette and indicated Superior Paving of Marquette had originally declined to bid; however Superior Paving of Houghton wished to submit their bid. Motion by Susan J. LaFernier to reconsider the bid and approve Superior Paving of Houghton in the amount of \$32,285 to blacktop The Rez Stop and the Smoke Shop parking lot, supported by Gary Loonsfoot, Sr. Seven supported (Misegan, Minton, S. LaFernier, Blaker, Haataja, M. LaFernier, Loonsfoot), 0 opposed, 0 abstained, four absent (Curtis, Edwards, Messer, Shalifoe), motion carried.

CEO Larry Denomie III requested some clarification on an approval of \$200,000 being made to the Ojibwa Housing accounts, when he was not present at the meeting. He checked with Susan J. LaFernier (accounting) who indicated that the checks had been processed. Denomie stated, "Beth Connor has reported that there is already another \$180,000 stacked in OHA payables that need to be paid. We need to discuss who these vendors are and have a meeting on how to resolve these issues." Consensus is to hold a Council meeting regarding only Housing issues in two weeks, and it will be held at the Zeba Community Building. A date will be forthcoming.

Council adjourned the meeting with no further issues on the agenda.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE 2015

The following are a list of activities that occurred in the office of the President for the month of June 2015.

- I attended an environment forum hosted by the KBIC NRD. The theme of this was "Weaving a Sustainable Future."
 - * The forum included a keynote speech from Sault Ste. Marie Chippewa Tribe Environmental Program Manager Kathleen Brosemer, informational booths, a presentation from the KBIC Committee for Alternative and Renewable Energy, and a variety of breakout sessions on topics including: planning for climate change, wildlife stewardship, the effect of mining on treaty resources, recycling, and indoor air quality.
- I notified the senior citizens that a discussion took place regarding their request for a reduced fee for camping at the Ojibwa Park, and their request was denied. The Council decided that the rates are offered at a lower price than any other area and granted their request to keep it one flat fee for Tribal Members which is at a discounted price and fair to all.
- Lundin Mining confirmed that they have discovered new high-grade Nickel-Copper near Eagle Mine. The discovery is located approximately two kilometers east of the Eagle deposit and is a consequence of the step out drilling program. They have finally confirmed that there is that deposit that was east of the original deposit and confirmed the things that we knew. They drilled the portal the way they did because they were going to go to the east. This was our suspicion early on, and they have pretty much confirmed it. With this news it seems like this deposit may be mined after the original deposit is mined. So it appears that the mining company may be here for a longer time.
- We are continuing our ongoing effort to bring the new Zeba Hall, Scoops, and the Rez Stop up to compliance with the Community's Building Codes. There was an issue with the deck that was installed, and the hazard has since been corrected. The oversight of the deck issue wasn't due to the crew who installed it. In addition, we've put topsoil around the hall, and George "Pudgy" Geroux and crew have done an excellent job on it. Once all of the punch list items have been taken care of, we are planning on a grand opening ceremony.
- I attended the Senior Banquet to honor all of our recent high school graduates. The banquet was well received and attended by many people of the community. We wished all of the graduates continued success in whatever they choose to do in their futures.
- A number of people are interested in

- learning whether or not the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community is willing to explore a medical marijuana business on the reservation. There are about 114,000 medical marijuana card users in Michigan, and there is a demand for the product. Because the voters approved the referendum related to cannabis, I think we should at least explore these opportunities. This could evolve into a business to sell more native natural healing plants and herbs.
- I attended a workshop in Green Bay, Wisconsin, related to Tribal Marijuana. The Workshop was put on by Rob Porter, with whom we have had a longstanding working relationship throughout the years. He introduced a number of individuals of CaNaUSA and a few other organizations.
 - CaNaUSA is a group who are proposing a joint venture and are successful business people. They believe the profits from this business could rival the casino revenues.
- * I attended a meeting with the Great Lakes Inter-Tribal Council also related to medical marijuana. They are in the infancy stages of planning and developing what they will be doing in Wisconsin.
- * I've also had some outreach from Wild Bill's Tobacco. They are the second largest tobacco retailer in Michigan, and they are interested in pursuing a business relationship with the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community
- * Additionally, so is the St. Croix Chippewa Tribe. In fact, I just returned from a conference over in Portland and Salem, Oregon, where a number of St. Croix Chippewa Members were also in attendance. We identified a medical marijuana facility in addition to some labs. I will have more upcoming information related to this as I just returned a few days ago.
- The Council discussed the foreclosed property of the Baraga Lakeside Inn and decided not to bid at the auction that was held at the Baraga County Clerk's office in L'Anse, Michigan.
- On behalf of the Community, I provided comments to the Michigan Petroleum Pipeline Task Force. We are particularly concerned with Enbridge, Inc.'s line 5 which runs through our 1842 Treaty area in the Upper Peninsula and then beneath the Straits of Mackinac. Line 5 is twelve years past its designed lifetime, and there is lack of transparency with regard to what products are flowing through the pipeline at any given time. We are continuing to monitor what is going on with Enbridge's line 5 because of the huge impacts it could have to our

- water resources here that we so much depend on.
- Our mining technical assistant is keeping the Office of the President informed of Highland Copper Company's efforts to examine the environmental conditions found in White Pine. Dave Anderson is the Director of Environment at Highland Copper Company and is welcoming discussion and site visits. They remain open to joint collection of data, review, and improvement of sampling protocol and information sharing. In fact two days ago, I received a telephone call from Representative Dianda, regarding this issue, and he would like to set a meeting with the Office of the President and any other Council Members who are interested in going up to White Pine to have an initial meeting with them to discuss what they plan on doing with the copper mine and some of the issues that the Community has with the copper mine and the environment up there. We will be coordinating that meeting in the near future.
- We received notification from the Environmental Review Appeals Board that a petition for review related to the groundwater discharge permit that the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality issued to Eagle Mine dismissed the petition for lack of jurisdiction. The Community filed a letter in support of the petition. The primary argument is that the issued groundwater permit is the wrong tool with which to regulate Eagle Mine's wastewater discharges.
- I, along with a number of staff, attended the 4th Annual Bureau of Indian Affairs Midwest Region Partners in Action Conference held in Baraboo, Wisconsin. While I was there, I had the opportunity to talk with Diane Rosen and a number of other Bureau staff. I took this opportunity to sit down with them and talk about our fire program and a number of other ongoing things here at KBIC. It was a good meeting, and we all had a good time.
- The Ford Farm Road Project should be out on bids by August as planned, and we are hoping to complete this and the Ben Road Project as well. We are meeting the timelines, and Bruce La-Pointe has informed me that as soon as we get these bids in we can start moving forward and get these projects done.
- In addition to committee meetings, phone calls, and responding to Tribal Members' concerns the Office of the President has been very busy for the first six months. If there is anything I can do, please don't hesitate to call me at (906) 201-1703, and I'll see what I can do for you.

CEO'S REPORT FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE 2015

During the month of June 2015, the CEO's office reports the following:

- The newly approved Enterprises Employee Manual was reviewed with the employees who are required to follow it throughout the month.
- Darrell Kingbird began his duties as the Tribe's Language Instructor. He will be teaching Ojibwemowin language classes on a beginner level to both Native and Non-Native students in the Baraga and L'Anse Area schools, the L'Anse/Baraga Community schools, to our Summer Youth Program participants, as well as teach cultural and traditional crafts, stories, songs, medicines, and oral tradition within our community.
- Vicki Dompier, who has been serving as the Housing Department's Interim Executive Director, was approved for promotion by the Selection Committee to serve as the department's permanent director. Her contract is being developed by the attorney's office and is expected to be ready for review and consideration next week.
- An Indian Community Development Block Grant through HUD was submitted in June. The grant, if approved, will assist the Tribe with mold remediation issues in our Tribal housing units. Numerous issues have been identified throughout the units of which some have required residents to be transferred to alternative homes.
- The Tribal Council approved a resolution granting a lease agreement with New Cingular Wireless PCS, LLC. The agreement provides space in the Tribe's Industrial Park for the company to construct a tower for the purpose of transmission and reception of communications signals. The lease provides the company with an initial five year term with automatic renewals for four additional five year terms unless terminated by the Tribe.
- Tribal Council received and reviewed the final report issued by Global Market Advisors (GMA). The recommendations

- are being explored and firms contracted to provide assistance in developing plans. A meeting has been tentatively scheduled for August 3, where the GMA team will share the plan with the Community. Once the date, time, and location have been finalized, notification will be made to the Community through media sources.
- Gary Jorgenson of Lake Accounting has been working for several weeks at the Housing Department to aid staff with accounting functions. I met with Gary recently, and he indicated that he has spent his time to date organizing, searching, and developing systems to bring the accounting to standards and efficiencies which will allow for smoother operation and consistency in function. We will be approving an additional period of time for Gary to work in the department to get much needed financial information and reports to better manage the Housing Dept. and businesses.
- The General Manager position that was offered to Joseph Olujic is now being offered to Michael Schrader. Mr. Olujic declined the position after receiving an offer from another organization.
- Carole LaPointe, KBIC Health Department Director, issued a notice indicating that July 16 of this year marked the 44th year that the Tribe has provided health services to the people of the community. The department is planning a celebration in August during the National Health Center Week August 9-15.
- The Annual Governmental Employee Picnic will be taking place on July 31 at the L'Anse Golf Course beginning at 10 a.m. Because of the picnic, governmental offices of the Tribe will be closed to allow employees to attend the event.
- In a final note, it has been expressed that Council would like a weekly report from the CEO's office of which I will begin providing at the meeting next Thursday.

New Employee



Darrell Kingbird, a Red Lake Tribal Member, began employment mid-June as KBIC's Cultural Language Teacher. Darrell said, "I applied for this position because I want to teach the language to children in the school setting." He previously taught Ojibwa language in the community at Red Lake but was not able to get into the school setting there. Kingbird will be going into both the L'Anse and Baraga Schools, and he's going to give a try to work with all grade levels. He will also be teaching the language at the L'Anse/Baraga Community School setting. "Any place that we can get the language in, we are going to give it a try. I plan on starting a class with the elders next Tuesday (07/28/2015) which will be held at the Zeba Community Hall. Next month, I will be teaching at the Summer Youth Program's Cultural Camp throughout that week."

Darrell Kingbird relocated to KBIC from Red Lake bringing his wife and five children with him, to become a part of the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community. He has taught language for about 31 years, beginning when he was 19-years-old at United Tribes in Minneapolis as their Cultural Coordinator where he worked for two-and-a-halfyears. "I taught them how to sing, bead, make outfits, and the language. I started teaching that way, and I've been doing it even since. I taught Middle School at Mille Lacs Tribal School for four-and-a-half years. I learned the language in my home, both my parents were fluent speakers. So it wasn't like I went to school to learn the language, and this is how I teach the language in the class room—question and answer routines, sentence structure, until we are speaking completely back and forth in the language. The youth will catch on to the language, and the more time I have with them the more it is going to make a difference to them to understand, and they are going to bring it home big time. The parents are going to have to step up and encourage their children. So we want to get the parents involved and start having classes for them, so they will get the same structure as the children will get, so when the child comes home and speaks the language they will know the answers. The parents will get the same curriculum in the home as the children will get it in the school setting This is the technique that I use, and it goes a long way. My dream is to make the difference in this Community's language."



CONGRATULATIONS DR. LEAH MAYO



Leah Mayo earned her Ph.D. in Neurobiology from the University of Chicago in April 2015. Leah was a 2005 Baraga graduate, and then attended the University of Michigan, receiving her B.S. in Neuroscience in 2008.

After working for a year at the University of Michigan's Molecular and Behavioral Neuroscience Insti-

tute, she then enrolled in the Neurobiology doctoral program at the University of Chicago. She received a M.S. in Molecular Medicine in 2013 and went on to receive her doctoral degree in Neurobiology in

Throughout her scientific career, Leah's research has focused on understanding environmental influences on drug taking, with a special interest in determining factors that can predict vulnerability to developing substance use disorders. Her research has been presented at numerous conferences throughout the United States, as well as Canada, Sweden, France, and Germany.

While in graduate school, Leah received the Neuroscience Scholars Program fellowship from the Society for Neuroscience, the Pritzker Award for Academic Achievement from the University of Chicago, and has been the recipient of several other awards and honors. She has been identified as an outstanding Early Career Scientist by the National Institute on Drug Abuse and the College on Problems of Drug Dependency. Last summer, Leah was invited to attend the Lindau Nobel Laureates Meeting in Lindau, Germany, where she attended a week-long conference with nearly 40 Nobel Prize Laureates. Leah competed with 20,000 of the top graduate students and early-career scientists under the age of 35 throughout the world for the honor of attending the event.

Leah's research has been published in several prestigious scientific journals, including Nature, The Journal of Neuroscience, and Neuropsychopharmacology. She has also authored a book chapter regarding genetic influences on addiction.

Leah will be moving to Linkoping, Sweden in August 2015, where she will be a founding member of Linkoping University's Center for Social and Affective Neuroscience. In addition to teaching medical students, she will carry out research aimed at elucidating social and environmental influences on drug taking. This work will be part of a greater effort to create more effective, personalized treatments for alcoholism and other substance abuse disorders.


